## David Rutherford Bagenstose (1916 - 2002)

"Dave" was a great participant and contributor to the well being of our Family Association. He served as a Director for twenty years (1965 – 1984), including five years as President (1974 - 1979), followed by four more years as Vice President (1980 – 1984). During his career he showed himself to be a superb salesman and business partner and was well known for his sense of humor. Dave passed away in Devon, PA on June 25, 2002. His wife of 52 years, "Betsy," has since joined him in God's Kingdom. Dave and Betsy are survived by two daughters and six grandchildren.

### This Year's Program

Long before electric or gas refrigerators, in the summertime housewives had to preserve foods by putting root vegetables in a "cold cellar," using a drying method, or canning. Finally, ice harvesting became a very popular idea whereby ice was cut during the winter months, held in ice houses and packed with sawdust. Everyone started to purchase ice boxes. The boxes were not unlike our early refrigerators. Most of them opened at the top and held a large block of ice. The lower section contained shelves. Iced tea and lemonade could now be more refreshing by adding chips of ice. Fresh fruits and vegetables could now be preserved for at least a few days. Modern refrigerators now make their own ice and the "ice man does not cometh" anymore!

About thirty years ago, Robert Bagenstose bought one of those wooden ice boxes and restored it. They were usually made of oak and are a very nice piece of furniture, enhancing anyone's home. This intrigued Robert, and he found the "bug had bitten" him. This led to his collecting tools, toys, ice cards for the window and much more memorabilia. We are most fortunate to have Robert for our program at the Reunion in August, to share his knowledge of the process of ice harvesting. On a hot day in August, this is sure to be a "cool" subject. ## BACKENSTOSS NIGHT AT THE "BALL GAME!!"

With your support, the Backenstoss Family Association will hold a "Backenstoss Family Day at the Reading Phillies' FirstEnergy Stadium in Reading, Pennsylvania. This event has been scheduled for Sunday, August 20, when the Reading Phillies host the New Britain Rock Cats. Game time is 1:05 P.M.

Our group will be part of the "Coors Light Deck Party." We will have reserved seats along the leftfield foul line and a 2 hour, "all you can eat" buffet in the picnic area, located directly behind the leftfield seats. The menu includes: barbecued chicken, hamburgers, hot dogs, baked beans, pasta and potato salads, lemonade, iced tea and Pepsi products. Doors to the stadium open at 11:45 A.M., and the buffet begins at that time. We will enter the stadium through the gate on Front St., conveniently located behind the leftfield seats.

Ticket prices are \$17.00 per person. Children aged four and under are free, unless they require their own seat, in which case there is a \$7.00 charge. If our response is sufficient, we will also have "The Backenstoss Family Association" recognized on the stadium scoreboard.

#### INTERESTING NOTES FROM OUR FAMILY HISTORY

- The "Hearthstone Town and Country" newsletter contained the following item in its Saturday, October 7, 1905 edition:
  - "Dr. M.J. Backenstoe, of Emaus, on Thursday purchased the Solomon Boyer homestead at the northwest corner of Seventh and Turner streets, from Miss Sallie Boyer, for \$7,500. After making improvements on the property the doctor will locate at Allentown for practice."
- My Great Great Aunt Catherine Bagenstos Horn, wife of John Horn, lived in Chambersburg, Franklin Co., PA when the southern soldiers passed through on their way Gettysburg. She gave food and water to the Confederate soldiers, but hid Union soldiers, and their horses(!), in their basement. She had her nine children make a great deal of noise to hide the sounds of the union soldiers and their horses. Catherine was the daughter of Jacob B. Bagenstos and Magdalena Leap.


